

# The NARCOMS Registry: Publication Review 1996-2013

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### **Background**

NARCOMS, a project of the CMSC, was started in 1993 as a long-term self-report registry of persons with MS. Enrollment began in 1996, with longitudinal follow up beginning in 2000. There are over 37,000 participants enrolled in NARCOMS with follow-up information provided by over 25,000

Since 1997, researchers have utilized data collected through NARCOMS in over 200 presentations, papers and magazines:

- First Abstract: 1997
- First Manuscript: 1999
- First Platform Presentation: 2003
- First Issue of the Multiple Sclerosis Quarterly Report (MSQR): 2009
- First Issue of NARCOMS Now: Spring 2012

Sharing NARCOMS data and results with the scientific community via a wide range of journals and conferences is an important way to spread knowledge and insight gained from analyzing Registry data and to inspire further studies in MS. Disseminating NARCOMS results also helps practitioners get the latest information as quickly as possible, while providing a reliable source of information for health care policy and advocacy initiatives.

#### NARCOMS Research

Prospective researchers work with the NARCOMS Executive Committee and research team to plan potential projects. Projects may involve data collection that would:

- · use existing NARCOMS data
- gather new data via a regular NARCOMS semi-annual update
- create a survey designed with input from the Executive Committee
- have NARCOMS contact participants for external studies

Study designs may be cross-sectional or longitudinal, retrospective or prospective. Studies may aim to gather data from all NARCOMS participants or from a targeted subgroup, depending upon the specific project. The NARCOMS research team will work with you to design your research proposal to get the most out of the information collected via NARCOMS participants. All projects require applicable IRB approval.



Since 1997, 138 abstracts utilizing NARCOMS have been accepted for poster, platform, workshop, or short course presentations (Figure 1).



In 2012, 23 presentations were made in 4 countries. including topics: Symptom Worsening


- Progression

### **Publications**





Figure 4. NARCOMS publications by year

Since 1999, 65 manuscripts have been published with an average of 5 annually (Figure 4). There has been an increase in the number of publications since 2008 coinciding with increased longitudinal follow up.
